### Predatory Offender Informational Town Hall

This week we have been hearing about Ming Sen Shiue and his horrible crimes committed in 1980. After serving his 30-year sentence, Mr. Shiue is undergoing a Civil Commitment Trial, which would continue his confinement, as he is set for parole in July of this year. Anoka County officials hope that it will be ruled that Mr. Shiue will be deemed as a "sexual psychopathic personality and sexually dangerous person if he is paroled".

What does all of this mean? What does it mean when a person who has been deemed as a Risk Level III, Level II, or Level I moves into the community?

**Around the Clock**

**Chaska Officers issued 41 citations and 26 warnings during this reporting period.**

**There were 219 calls for service**

**Disturbances:**

A male and female became involved in an argument at their residence. The male pushed, scratched and bit the female. The male then consumed an unknown quantity of prescription pills. Officers arrived and took the male into custody. He was placed on a welfare hold and transported to a hospital. He was charged with domestic assault and 5<sup>th</sup> degree assault.

Three juveniles pulled shingles off the roof of a bus shelter near Kings Lane, causing damage to the structure. The three offenders were referred to juvenile court for criminal damage to property.

Officers responded to a property damage complaint at a bar in downtown Chaska. Someone uprooted three tree bushes from the property, and placed them in front of the exterior doors.



When arriving for work early one morning, McDonalds employees found an intoxicated man, who was lying on the ground outside the building. Officers arrived and made contact with the man. He was clearly intoxicated and could not tell the police where he was or who he had been with in Chaska. He had no recollection of the past evening. He was placed in detox facility.



**Notable:**

**At least he's honest...**

Police received a report of a possible intoxicated driver in the area of Village Road. After searching the area, the vehicle was located at the home of the driver. The male driver was inside the home and opened his door to speak to the police. Without any prompting, the male told the police he knew they were there to take him away because he was really drunk. He continued by stating he knew he had too much to drink and had driven over some grass. He agreed to perform field sobriety evaluations. During the evaluations, the male attempted to read a badge on an officer's uniform shirt. He told the officer he could not read it because he was "way, way too drunk right now". He also told the officer he was "way drunker now than a couple minutes ago". Not surprisingly, the intoxicated driver was arrested and charged with DWI. A breath test indicated a .205 BAC.



**Car vs House x 2...**

On April 13, a man was driving his car while wearing sandals on Hundertmark Road. His sandal became stuck on the accelerator and the car crashed through a residential garage wall, creating a large hole. There were no injuries.



On April 15, a woman attempted to back her car out of a residential driveway on Campfire Curve. She thought the vehicle was in reverse. It was not. The vehicle was in drive and when she hit the accelerator, the car drove through the closed garage door and crashed into the interior garage wall. The crash caused extensive damage to the garage door, the interior of the garage and the vehicle. There were no injuries.

Unfortunately, both crashes did not occur at the home of the drivers. And in both cases, the homeowners were home at the time of the crash and did not know the driver.

Chaska officers collected automobile parts from some unusual places last week after Detectives Rachel Nelson and Lee

McClure solved a theft case. It all started last weekend when the owner of a 1979 Camaro reported the engine, transmission, radiator, and other parts were stolen from it while it was parked on private property. Detective Nelson talked to the suspect who denied taking the items and said the new engine he just put into his 1970 Camaro was purchased from a friend. As Detective Nelson worked to disprove the lie, the suspect began to hide parts. Detective Nelson built a case against the suspect and later arrested him at a residence in Chaska. It was then that the suspect admitted to stealing and then hiding the parts. Those not installed in his car – including the transmission – where now hidden in his mother's attic and shed. Officers were able to retrieve all the parts and Chaska Public Works employees are in the process of separating the stolen engine and other parts from the arrested party's vehicle.
