Chaska Officers issued 38 citations and 46 warnings
during this reporting period.
There were 253 calls for service

Disturbances:

A female driver was stopped for driving with a revoked license on Hundertmark Road. Two bags containing methamphetamine were found inside the vehicle. The female was arrested and charged with 5th degree possession of a controlled substance, driving after revocation and no proof of motor vehicle insurance.



An officer observed a vehicle in Lions Park after hours. Several males were inside the vehicle. One male was charged for violating curfew and possessing a drug pipe. Another male was charged with possession of marijuana.



A male paid only a portion of a cab fare before running from the cab on foot on Woodridge Drive. The cab driver reported the incident to the police. Officers were able to identify the male through his driver's license photograph. Police later spoke to the offender by phone. He stated he had planned to return to the area to pay for the remaining cab fare. The male was charged with theft of services.

Two males continually set off fireworks in a neighborhood during early morning hours on Saturday July 3rd. Residents reported the disturbance to police, who responded to the area. The males could not be found initially, only a large amount of firework remnants in the road. Police advised residents to call if the males returned. At nearly 3:00 AM, police again received calls that the males were back and were again lighting fireworks. They also swore at one resident and threw firework remnants in his yard. The males ran and hid from officers as they arrived in the area. They were quickly found and taken into custody. Both had consumed alcohol and were under the age of 21. One was in possession of marijuana and a drug pipe. The males were placed under arrest and charged with disorderly conduct, noisy assembly, littering, discharge of fireworks, minor consumption, possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.



Notable:

A "Gross" Misdemeanor...



An officer responded to a residence for a report of vandalism to a vehicle, parked in the driveway. The male owner reported discovering an open door on his van and a pile of "stuff" lying in the driveway. The "stuff" to which he referred consisted of a shirt, a lighter, and two packs of gum. A pool of partially digested stomach contents (yes, throw up) was found in the driveway, on the side of the vehicle and inside the vehicle. It seemed reasonable that whoever had entered the vehicle had suddenly become a tad nauseous and threw up. In addition to the offender's "stuff" and stomach contents, he also left behind his MN identification card. As one would expect, he was not difficult to track down. The vomiting villain admitted to police, as being the one who entered the van and stated the found items were his. However, he stated he was very intoxicated and did not remember all the details from the evening. He did remember throwing up in the van, then removing his shirt. Police charged him with tampering with a motor vehicle.

Another Internet Scam



Be very wary of any emails that appear to be from a friend or loved one that requests immediate funds because they are stranded overseas. One ongoing scam involves crooks hijacking e-mail or social networking contacts then sending what appears to be an emergency request for money from the account holder. The fraudulent emails often claim that the victim was robbed while traveling and is in immediate need of funds for plane tickets, hotel bills, etc... Do not reply to the emails.

One excellent resource is the Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3), www.ic3.org, which explains different internet fraud schemes and offers tips to protect yourself. The IC3 website also allows you to report internet fraud attempts and refers them to law enforcement agencies, including the Chaska Police Department, when necessary. If you have been the victim of a fraud, contact the Chaska Police Department to report the crime.
